
George Eastman: The Innovator Who Revolutionized Photography


Later Life and Legacy

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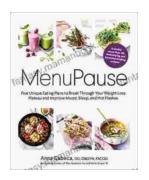
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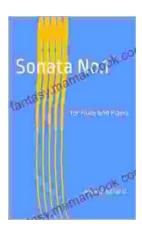
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
